



From the Director

This coming season will stand out as one of the seminal moments in the history of the Gallery. On 6th September Sarjeant Gallery Te Whare o Rehua Whanganui will have been open to the public for 100 years.

Throughout a most tumultuous century the Gallery has reflected the changing tastes and trends in art and culture and the coming years will provide fertile ground for artists and curators to develop works and exhibitions undreamt of even in the recent past. To facilitate these changes and cope with future demands on the Gallery and its resources, our building redevelopment project is in full swing. Expected to commence in the last quarter of this year from September onwards, our strengthening renewal and extension will provide a future-proofed facility and a blank canvas for local, national and international creatives.

In celebration of our centenary and in conjunction with Whanganui Heritage Month, the Sarjeant is hosting more than a dozen events of different types. From gallery talks and building tours to musical interludes, a formal public ceremony on the Gallery steps at Pukenamu Queen's Park, a significant exhibition opening and the unveiling of an extraordinary gift from the Friends of the Sarjeant, the months of August and September will be very full.

In addition to this exciting occasion we continue business as usual with our Spring series of exhibitions commencing with a special centennial show: *Turn of a Century*, an extended run of Wi Taepa's excellent exhibition Retrospect; and Julia Holden's Her Indoors. The Gallery shop is soon to stock a new range of Sarjeant-branded merchandise to coincide with our centenary celebrations and the next limited edition run of ten For the Love of Truth and Beauty prints by Catherine Macdonald, is shortly to be available in store and online.

The coming weeks offer a wonderful array of activities, exhibitions, concerts and events sure to attract people with all types of interests. We look forward to seeing our regular visitors and we certainly would love to welcome any newcomers keen to enjoy and explore what the Sarjeant has to offer.—GREG ANDERSON

Redevelopment news

It's August already and I am pleased to report that the project is in on track for construction to commence in September/October of this year.

We have worked through the completion of the detailed design phase of the project which takes us beyond earlier design or quantity surveys to ensure all design and build decisions are the best and most cost effective available. This involved a lot of complex background work and site visits by structural engineers, stone masonry experts, heritage specialists and architects Warren and Mahoney. Videos are being made of each of the visits so the community can experience some of the design decisions through the eyes of these experts and master craftspeople. The team has received a lot of positive feedback about the videos available on our website which are an essential part of documenting the redevelopment journey.

Expressions of interest have been invited from prospective construction partners nationwide and we have entered the tendering phase of the project wherein the best pre-selected construction companies have been requested to submit a price for the redevelopment (RFP). As well as presenting a price, each

tenderer has been asked to demonstrate their capacity and delivery performance for a range of non-price attributes to ensure we receive best value.

In order to secure the most competitive tender price, the updated cost estimate for the redevelopment needs to remain confidential although we do know that the Manawatu/Whanganui region is currently experiencing an increase in the number of large infrastructure projects including defence projects at Ohakea and Linton and expect this may impact on the availability of capable tradespeople. An estimated 230 - 290 construction related jobs will be required for the entire project redevelopment.

One of the unique features of the Queen's Park gallery is its naturally lit exhibition spaces enabled by a number of strategically located skylights. The necessary addition of steel framing and a roof diaphragm has presented a challenge for the design team to integrate the seismic solution with the skylights. New heating and ventilation equipment also needs to find a place on the roof and inside the building sprinkler systems, CCTV and security cameras must all be aesthetically proportioned and designed. —GAYE BATTY, Project Director

Turn of a Century: New perspectives on 100 years of collecting and exhibiting

7 SEPTEMBER, 2019 — 9 FEBRUARY, 2020

'It is my desire that works of art shall be purchased or acquired on account of their intrinsic value as work of high art only and not because they are specimens of local or colonial art so that the said gallery shall be furnished with works of the highest art in all branches as a means of inspiration for ourselves and those who come after us.'—HENRY SARJEANT

One hundred years after this visionary statement the Sarjeant is at a significant turning point in its history. As it moves into its second century the magnificent gallery that bears Henry Sarjeant's name is about to be transformed from an early twentieth century example of neo-classical architecture into a truly twenty first century building. For those who are familiar with the building, the experience of visiting it is as much about being inspired by architecture, light, symmetry and space as it is about seeing the best of historical and contemporary art exhibited in our ever-changing exhibition programme.

Since 2014 when the gallery transferred operations to its temporary site at 38 Taupō Quay, the Pukenamu Queens Park building has been vacant and earlier this year gallery staff completely emptied the site of all that remained —crates, plinths, archives, the detritus of a century's worth of occupation. With any project of this scale it's easy to show the memorable parts and why wouldn't we? The building is beautiful. But what of the back spaces, the workings of the building - heating systems, ducts, skylights, wall linings and late additions to the building that will be removed in the redevelopment project?

For this exhibition we have invited ten artists working in the media of photography and sculpture, (many of whom have had an association with the gallery) to respond to the empty building. Photographers Adrienne Martyn, Neil Pardington, Andrew Ross and Roberta Thornley have captured images

that are both familiar—the beautiful light and architecture of the empty spaces alongside the unexpected—a spiral staircase, a roof hatch and the internal structures of the skylights.

Annie Mackenzie, Regan Gentry and Glen Hayward have all incorporated now superfluous parts of the building and its operation into their works, having 'upcycled' the junk of the building into intriguing new sculptural works. Included in the exhibition is a chandelier created by glass artists, Jim Dennison and Leanne Williams of the Crystal Chain Gang. This is a truly unique work as all of the components that make up the chandelier have been modelled on the intricate plaster details from the building's interior. Peter Trevelyan whose exhibition 'Delineate' was on view over Winter has created a site specific sculpture that will be installed on the exterior of the historic building.

In conversation and contrast to these newly commissioned pieces are historical and contemporary works that show the breadth and complexity of a collection that spans over four centuries of European and New Zealand art history and is one that we think befits Henry's original vision.

Julia Holden: Her Indoors

28 SEPTEMBER, 2019-2 FEBRUARY, 2020

During her time at Tylee Cottage, painter Julia Holden made a series of five portraits that featured people from the community reimagined as portraits from the gallery's collection and these were included in our exhibition marking the 125th Anniversary of Women's Suffrage, late last year. This series continued Holden's uniquely performative technique, where each portrait was created by literally transforming her subjects into the painting by applying wet paint to the sitter's skin and clothing. The record of this performance is a photograph, thereby making her process a unique blend of performance, painting and photography.

For her post-residency exhibition Holden has taken quite a different approach and created an expansive new body of work titled *Her Indoors*. This series further explores the theme of women's suffrage but more so as it presents a snapshot of what it means to be a woman now, 125 years after that remarkable achievement. For the series Holden has painted portraits in oils of local women who she met as well as other friends who visited her at Tylee Cottage during her time in Whanganui. The participants range in age from their late teens to in their 70s and each of the subjects were photographed by Holden in the studio at the cottage, hence each of the portraits have the same background and distinctive green day bed.

Through chatting with her subjects and recording their stories and making audio recordings Holden has created a time-capsule of women in Whanganui at this time. Holden's title for the show *Her Indoors* references the expectations of traditionally feminine domestic roles, and specifically how she and other women work, indoors with domestic and working lives intertwining. Through the series Holden also wants to speak to the subjects own 'indoors' in the sense of their interior creative lives through audio recordings.

We are very grateful to Creative New Zealand who supported Holden's residency at Tylee Cottage via the Toi Uru Kahikatea funding stream. In addition the artist was successful in securing further financial assistance from Creative New Zealand via a pool of funding that was available to support projects that marked the 125th Anniversary of women's suffrage in New Zealand.

As has been the case with Holden's work to date, this project is testament to an artist who has an innovative approach to her craft that combines that of a skilled painter and story teller. We'd like to congratulate Holden on a stunning new body of work and thank all of the participants in the project and Creative New Zealand for their generous support.—**GREG DONSON**, *Curator & Public Programmes Manager*

Centenary Celebrations


The Sarjeant Gallery will be celebrating its 100th year with a number of activities on Friday 6
September and Saturday 7 September and also, will be a key player in the inaugural Whanganui Heritage Month with a range of events, talks and tours focusing on the history of the Gallery, its collection and Whanganui through the eyes of artists over the decades.

First up will be a public ceremony on Friday 6 September at 3pm to which everyone is invited. It will be held on the steps of the old Gallery at Pukenamu Queen's Park and will include speeches, a grand birthday cake in the shape of the Gallery and a dual choir performance from Schola Sacra and the Wanganui Community Choir. Sarjeant Gallery director Greg Anderson says "the whole community is invited to join us on the steps of the Sarjeant Gallery at Pukenamu Queen's Park to celebrate the one hundred year anniversary of the Sarjeant Gallery being open. It is a momentous occasion and as such we would

like to properly recognise it."

On Saturday 7 September the gallery will open the *Turn of a Century* exhibition at Sarjeant on the Quay which is a perspective on the Sarjeant's one hundred years of collecting and exhibiting and in which the Friends Centenary Chandelier will appear for the first time. This chandelier will be presented to the gallery as a 100th birthday present from the Friends of the Sarjeant Gallery and ultimately will prominently hang in the redeveloped building when it reopens.

On Saturday 7 September there will be a multitude of things to do and see as the Sarjeant celebrates its big birthday. The River City Big Band will be at the River Traders Market from 10.30 to 11.30am and the Mayor will give a speech at 11am. Curator and Public Programmes Manager Greg Donson will lead a free talk with the artists featured in *Turn of a Century*, and there will be free family day activities at Sarjeant on the Quay with artist demonstrations, family and kids' activities, musical performances and a photo booth.


