### **EXHIBITIONS**

### Together Alone: Works from the Collection Exploring Human Connections in a Post-Lockdown World 27 June – 8 November

This exhibition brings together a selection of works that hint at some of the experiences we all shared or could not partake in during lockdown.

## Lighting the Fire: Whanganui Potters from the Sarjeant Collection

### 4 July - 22 November

This exhibition showcases six of Whanganui's celebrated potters and acknowledges their contribution to ceramic practice in New Zealand.

### Andrea du Chatenier: Eigenleben

### 15 August - 8 November 2020

The German title of this exhibition, translates to 'one's own life' and refers to these new ceramic works by du Chatenier as having a life and evolution of their own.

### Te Awa Reo

### 31 October - 14 February

Fourteen artists respond to scientific research of an 8.75 metre core sample of sediment taken from the Ātene Meander on the Whanganui River. This project has been three years in the making and is a beautiful collision of science and art that is deeply connected to the Awa.

### Wai: The Water Project

### 21 November – 7 February

Thirteen New Zealand artists explore fresh water systems in Aotearoa and the cultural, environmental & political stories that surround them.

### **Corner Dairy**

### 5 December 2020 - 14 March 2021

This exhibition utilises the New Zealand dairy as a cultural point of contact that represents ingenuity, economy of means, nostalgia and a sense of fun. It brings together works that depict everyday items, for example confectionary, fruit and Kiwiana – the kinds of things found at the dairy, or reference the dairy itself.
