## From the Curator and Public Programmes Manager

Nothing is absolute. Everything changes, everything moves, everything revolves, everything flies and goes away.—Frida Kahlo

This quote is featured in the Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tāmaki's current exhibition *Frida Kahlo & Diego Rivera: Art & Life in Modern Mexico* which I was pleased to visit in November. It seems a fitting quote to open this Quarterly with since Auckland Art Gallery is where Greg Anderson, who after fifteen years as Director of the Sarjeant Gallery, has taken up the position of Deputy Director Operations. During Greg's time in Whanganui he has been largely responsible for turning the fortunes of the Gallery's Redevelopment Project around, alongside Nicola Williams, the chair of the Sarjeant Gallery Trust. Together they have steered the ship around, and the waters have not always been calm, but as Kahlo said, "everything changes, everything moves,

everything revolves." As a team, we'd like to thank Greg for his tenacity and perseverance with the project, we wish him all the best in his new role and look forward to seeing him back in Whanganui for our reopening in 2024.

The redevelopment project is moving ahead at pace and if you visit the site now, you'll see the steel framework for the first floor of the new wing Te Pātaka o Sir Te Atawhai Archie Taiaroa, it's heartening for us to see and we're now turning our attention to planning our return in detail. The last couple of months have been extremely busy and compared to the same time last year, the pace of our events schedule couldn't be more of a contrast. Heritage Month in October saw the Gallery host 11 events, these were all extremely well attended and were followed by the opening of an exhibition by members of the New Zealand Society of Artists in Glass (NZSAG). This is on view at the Gallery's object gallery upstairs in the iSite and was co-ordinated and installed by the talented team at New Zealand Glassworks and Members of the NZSAG committee. Glass is always popular and we're sure this exhibition will be popular for visitors to the Gallery over the summer season.

The 2022 Pattillo Whanganui Arts Review returned to our programme in a slightly later slot than normal due to necessary rescheduling. We had a record 212 entries this year with over 130 artists selected for the exhibition. A true testament to the wonderful creative energy in the region. This year's judge was Dr Chelsea Nichols—Senior Curator at the Dowse Art Museum. Dr Nichols made a wonderful selection of winners that you can learn more about in this Quarterly, including the Open Award Winner Chris Connolly with his elegant and superbly crafted wooden sculpture that features on the cover. We're looking forward to working with Chris on his solo exhibition as the recipient of the Pattillo Project, this will take place in the redeveloped gallery at Pukenamu Queen's Park.

There have been many other events that have taken place at the Gallery over the last few weeks and we're pleased that in light of the difficulties of the last couple of years, we seem to be returning to a new kind of normal. Paul Diamond launched his book *Downfall: The Destruction of Charles Mackay* about Whanganui's former Mayor, Charles Mackay; and Martin Edmond has been here researching the history of the Gallery, for his book due to be published when the Gallery reopens.

Be sure to visit the Gallery over the summer, there's plenty to see—including a new collection show of works by Peter Peryer (1941–2018), one of New Zealand's finest photographers and long time friend of the Sarjeant. # Redevelopment Update

It is exciting to have some new project achievements to report.

The main structural steel beams have been fully installed for the uppermost level of the tower block for the extension wing, Te Pātaka o Sir Te Atawhai Archie John Taiaroa. This is a major milestone for the project and with these beams in place the steel framing clearly shows the outline of the new wing.

Welding of steel beams and minor steel works will continue as the stair and lift shaft assemblies are installed and the carpenters are in full swing installing timber framing for the roof and walls. Standing inside the space, you get a real sense of the immense size and scale of the building.

The next step is to complete the green roof of the basement archive which will eventually be covered by grass and a tiled patio space. The basement is where the Sarjeant Gallery's extensive permanent collection will be housed.

The seismic strengthening of the basement foundations and walls of the original 103-year-old heritage building is now complete and the new suspended concrete floor has been installed throughout. Just the section of basement where the old stairwell is located in the north is still being worked on inside the building. The original timber floorboards will be reinstated once the historic wall surfaces have finished being restored and painted, nearer to the end of the building programme.

On the roof of the building, a steel ring beam is being progressively installed around the central dome and structural framing for the refurbished skylights is now in place in the west wing which has allowed us to remove areas of temporary propping inside the Gallery, which has been required to support the roof during heavy construction works. With these interior areas now clear, the centralised air conditioning and services installation can commence in the basement. The temperature and humidity control system will be connected to the new wing via an underground service tunnel that runs beneath the link building connecting the two wings together. There will also be ducting and services installed on the roof of both buildings to ensure strict environmental conditions are achieved and maintained to best practice standards.—GAYE BATTY, *Project Director, Sarjeant Gallery Redevelopment* 

# 2022 Pattillo Whanganui Arts Review

12 NOVEMBER-26 FEBRUARY, 2023

The Sarjeant Gallery was delighted to open the 34th iteration of this much-loved open call exhibition with our sponsor and partner *Pattillo*. Supported by a strong group of Whanganui businesses, this year's Review represents not only a wide array of awards but also a wonderful prize for the winner of the Open Award. In addition to a generous cash prize, Pattillo have also sponsored the *Pattillo Project*—where the winner of the Open Award will receive a solo exhibition at the Sarjeant Gallery with mentoring from the Gallery's curatorial team.

The judge this year was Dr. Chelsea Nichols, Senior Curator at the Dowse Art Museum. On arrival, Dr. Nichols said she was "struck by the astonishing breadth of creativity and inspiring artistic talent on display. It was so exciting to see in one place this snapshot of all the creative riches that seems to just ooze out of this region."

On judging the 2022 Whanganui Arts Review Dr. Nichols said, "I tried to come into this process with as open a mind as possible but deep down what I really hoped to find was an artist whose work I wasn't familiar with at all, and something that totally surprised delighted and baffled me in equal measure and Chris Connolly's work truly delivered on that."

The Sarjeant Gallery's Curator and Public Programmes Manager, Greg Donson says: "The Arts Review is always a highlight of the Gallery's exhibition programme and this year we had an incredible 212 entries. Of those, over 130 works are included in the exhibition. There's a lot to see and the standard of entries was very high. It takes great courage to enter a show like this so we'd like to thank all the artists for entering this year."

# Peter Peryer: Holy Tomato

3 DECEMBER -12 FEBRUARY, 2023



A bright red tomato positioned carefully on a carved wooden foot – curious subject matter for a photograph and perhaps made even more enigmatic by its title Holy Tomato. The 2006 photograph was taken by Peter Peryer (b.1941, d.2018) and is just one of the 180 works that the Sarjeant Gallery has in its care. Like other significant New Zealand photographers such as Laurence Aberhart, Anne Noble and Wayne Barrar the Sarjeant's ongoing friendship with Peryer was initiated

and fostered by the Gallery's former Director - Bill Milbank.

This exhibition features works created between 2003 and 2018, which were acquired by the Gallery in 2021 with generous assistance from his estate. With the addition of these works the Sarjeant has one of the most comprehensive collections of Peryer's photographic practice in a public gallery.


Peryer came to photography at the age of 32, late in comparison with other photographers. His output was constant but not prolific. He would often return, or revisit, subjects as a way of processing and percolating over long periods of time.

Families of photographs were something that Peryer often discussed in his practice and this exhibition is testament to that – the images nod and stretch toward each other. Although there are no portraits in the exhibition, his considered eye manages to give each of his images a distinctive personality.

In a 1995 catalogue essay to accompany the major survey of Peryer's work – Second Nature, Peter Weiermair commented: "Peryer's intention is to create a few compelling archetypal images that go beyond the careless verbosity of contemporary photography - to create photographs as complex as good poems, which can be read again and always differently."

# Collection Focus: Charles Blomfield

17 DECEMBER-5 MARCH, 2023

This Collection Focus exhibition showcases early New Zealand landscape painter Charles Blomfield (b.1848, d.1926) and is timed to coincide with the 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary of his birth. Born 5 January 1848 in London, England, Blomfield emigrated to New Zealand as a teenager. After making an attempt

to work the goldfields in Otago he became fascinated by New Zealand's native bush and embarked on a painting career despite having no previous training.

Blomfield travelled extensively throughout New Zealand on painting expeditions leaving his wife Ellen to take care of their seven children. In 1884 he spent six weeks painting numerous views of Te Otukapuarangi, the Pink and White Terraces at Lake Rotomahana, a natural phenomenon popular with tourists and identified as the eighth wonder of the world. Less than two years later on 10 June 1886 the eruption of Mount Tarawera destroyed and submerged the terraces. This devastating event increased the popularity of Blomfield's paintings and he subsequently painted hundreds more scenes of the terraces.

The works in this exhibition include a fiery scene of the Mount Tarawera eruption originally painted by Blomfield and made into a lithograph by A.D. Willis Ltd of Whanganui; another volcanic eruption, Mount Ngauruhoe in 1909, gifted to the Gallery earlier this year; and a farming station at nearby Mangamahu titled *The Shades, Aranui*.

The New Zealand Society of Artists in Glass (NZSAG) are pleased to present their 2022 Members Show at the Sarjeant Gallery in collaboration with New Zealand Glassworks.

Featuring over 50 entries from NZSAG members, this exhibition on show at the iSite Gallery demonstrates the breadth and variety of glass practice here in Aotearoa New Zealand: "We hope that this display of vibrancy and innovation of the transformative medium of glass both educates and inspires the community as well as the next generation of glass enthusiasts," says Emma Camden, President of NZSAG.

The judges were Grace Lai, Curator of Applied Arts & Design, Tāmaki Paenga Hira Auckland War Memorial Museum; Greg Donson, Curator & Public Programmes Manager, Sarjeant Gallery Te Whare o Rehua Whanganui; and Justine Olsen, Curator

of Decorative Art and Design, Museum of New Zealand Te Papa Tongarewa.

The Lazelle Supreme Award of \$3000, sponsored by Murray and Denise Lazelle, was awarded to Dunedin-based glass artist Mike Crawford for his work *Kāhu*.

The NZSAG Merit Award went to Lisa Bate for her work *The Pack IV*. The winner of the NZSAG Innovation Award was won by Vicki Fanning for her piece *fairgroundunicorn Glass Crown*.

The Money Poppins & Article People's Choice award will be voted on by the public and awarded at the culmination of the exhibition. The ballot box will be at the front desk of the Sarjeant Gallery on the Quay – so you can vote for your choice, up until the exhibition closes.

## Douglas MacDiarmid Centenary

November marked the centenary of Taihape-born painter Douglas Kerr MacDiarmid's (b. 14 November 1922, d. 26 August 2020) birth. To honour the occasion, the Sarjeant Gallery mounted an exhibition from 29 October until 11 December with a selection of MacDiarmid's works from our permanent collection. The Collection Focus was just one of many that took place simultaneously around the country to celebrate MacDiarmid and his extensive career.

Despite living in Paris since 1950, MacDiarmid maintained strong links to New Zealand as an expatriate artist, holding numerous solo exhibitions between 1949 and 2018. Although he felt at home in Europe, MacDiarmid kept coming back to New Zealand subject matter throughout his career. His works in the Gallery's collection are evidence of this.

MacDiarmid's last visit to New Zealand happened to be on the occasion of the opening for the exhibition *Whanganui River Stories* (February to April, 1996) – a group exhibition at the Sarjeant Gallery, which was part of the 1996 Whanganui River Festival.
